March Reading month was filled with all kinds of literacy activities. We hope your child told you about some of the many things that went on such as: Breakfast with Books, Mystery Reader Week, Teacher Swap reading week, Representative Beau LaFave reading to our elementary, the Delta Animal Shelter presentation, Key Club Fun Night, dress-up days to encourage unique opportunities to read, and of course, Reading Olympics. The 5th graders were the overall winners, but all competed with enthusiasm and had a great time!

We are very fortunate to have an active Parent-Teacher-Club at our school. They have worked extremely hard this year to put on activities such as the Family Night and Book Fair, which were very successful. They are frequently fundraising so that our students can have the resources, incentives, field trips, and programs that they need.

Our school will continue to offer a summer school program, but with less emphasis on "school". It will be more of a Summer Library Program and open to all. Research shows that in order to **not** see the "summer slide" with progress, children really only need 3 things: access to books, someone to support them, and free choice in reading.

M-Step testing started in April. This testing included the 3rd, 4th, and 5th graders. State assessments, of course, only show a fragment of everything your child has learned or is learning, but are there to make schools accountable. As parents you can show support for your school by making the experience as positive as possible.

SALMON IN THE CLASSROOM

The Salmon in the Classroom Program would like to thank the UP Sport Fishermen Group of Escanaba for purchasing an advanced water quality probe for our fish tank. The probes will be used to test water quality. This will help us to better care for our Chinook salmon that we are growing in our tank.

The Salmon in the Classroom project was started a couple of years ago, and we have had great success each year.

This year we started with 150 salmon eyed eggs from the Thompson Fish Hatchery. At this point we still have approximately 135 swim up fry in our tank. The 5th and 6th grade students help with water testing and feeding. Mr. Pilon is in charge of helping students with water testing and Austin Wicklund, a high school senior, is in charge of tank maintenance. We plan to release the salmon in the Whitefish River this spring.
